Service clubs and their role in our community

We often hear about service clubs – Kiwanis, Rotary, Kinsmen, Lions, Elks and so on. But what do we really know about them? What do they do?

Most are secular, non-political organizations that are dedicated to the improvement of people's lives around the world.

By definition a service club or service organization is a voluntary non-profit organization where members meet regularly to perform charitable works either by direct hands-on efforts or by raising money for other organizations. A service club is defined firstly by its service mission and secondly its membership benefits, such as social occasions, networking, and personal growth opportunities that encourage involvement.

Here in Kanata we have two Service Clubs: the Kanata-Hazeldean Lions Club and the Rotary Club of Ottawa-Kanata Sunrise.

We are delighted to have the President of each organization,

respectively Linda Leinan and Dwight Brown, talk to us about service clubs in general and their own club in particular.





Dwight Brown is a Rotary Club Member, volunteer and a businessman. He is an advocate of the 1% -- the dedicated minority of individuals in any community who give back to their neighbourhoods through ongoing involvement.

Dwight's role as President of the Rotary Club of Ottawa Kanata Sunrise gives him a platform to ask Who are you? How do you want to volunteer? What is Rotary? and Why Rotary? Finally he explains how service clubs could be the perfect vehicle to scratch that itch.





Linda Leinan has been a member of the Kanata-Hazeldean Lions Club since 2009, serving as President in the 2015 - '17 period. After retiring from a federal government career encompassing adult education, health products regulation and life sciences industry development, Linda has done life sciences business consulting, as well as support work for Kanata North Councillor Marianne Wilkinson.

Linda is a long-time coach and Board member of MAP Reintegration, a charitable organization which supports released offenders in reintegrating into the community. She is an active member of St John's Anglican Church, where she sings in the choir, and is also a member of Kanata Grandmothers Together, a Stephen Lewis Foundation-affiliated group which raises funds to help African grandmothers who are caring for AIDS orphans.

Linda has a Bachelor's degree in food science from the University of Saskatchewan and a Master's in adult education from St. Michael's College in Winooski, Vermont.

Falls should be a major concern for seniors

One in four people over the age of 65 will fall at least once each year, a rate that increases to one in two people over the age of 80. Approximately 70 Ottawa

residents die each vear due to falls. and in 2005, falls were the leading cause of injury, hospitalization, and death among Ottawa older adults.

It is estimated that there are 20,000 annual visits to Ottawa emergency rooms related to falls, most of which involve older adults (Burden of Injury, 2010)

Even when they do not require ER visits or hospitalizations, falls can have a lasting impact on older adults' independence and quality of life, leading to a decline in health and function. This may in turn lead to future falls with more serious outcomes, and additional health care costs.

The Probus Club of Western Ottawa is part of the international organization of Probus Clubs designed to serve the retired and semi-retired. The morning begins at 10:00 am with a time for coffee and socialization followed by a guest speaker.
