The UN mission to Haiti

Colonel Claude Desgagné, Director of CapabilityAnalysis

Colonel Desgagne will speak of his experiences as Chief of Staff and Deputy Commander to the Military Component Commander, during a United Nations Peace Support Operation in Haiti in 2017. His talk will include the UN mission in general, Canada's participation in it, and the events of 2017 which led to the termination and withdrawal of the military mission.



Colonel Claude Desgagné grew up in Ottawa and joined the Canadian Forces in 1987. He graduated from the Royal Military College in Kingston in 1991 with a Bachelor of Mechanical Engineering degree, subsequently earning his Navigator Wings in 1992.

Colonel Desgagné has served on the CH124 Sea King operationally, as a primary flight instructor, and as a flight test and evaluation officer, as both a Tactical Coordinator and an Acoustics Sensor Operator. Highlights of his career include serving two operational tours with 423 Maritime Helicopter Squadron, with several major deployments, notably with NATO to the Adriatic Sea and with a US Navy Carrier Strike Group in the Arabian Gulf, and serving as the Commanding Officer of 406 (Maritime) Operational Training Squadron at 12 Wing Shearwater. Most recently, he deployed and served as the Military Component Chief of Staff to the United Nations Stabilisation Mission in Haiti (MINUSTAH).

Throughout his career he has served in staff capacities at the Maritime Helicopter Project Management Office, at 1 Canadian Air Division Headquarters, at the Strategic Joint Staff, at the Canadian Joint Operations Command Headquarters, and within the Air Staff in the Directorate of Air Requirements for Maritime Aviation and as Director Operational Implementation for the new Cyclone Maritime Helicopter.

Colonel Desgagné is currently employed in Chief of Force Development, as the Director of Capability Analysis.

At our October Meeting

Tony Atherton - reporter, editor, columnist and senior writer for more than three decades, including over 20 years at the Ottawa Citizen, gave a well attended and fascinating discussion of the decline of the daily newspaper from its golden age when many journalists presented local and international news, to the present day when "news" (real or fake) is available from many sources on the web and papers present mainly opinion pieces from a limited cadre of syndicated writers.









Occasionally I visit the Military Cemetery in Beechwood. I have two military graves at which I stop. One was a private in WW2 who survived the war but could not escape the memories. For 27 years, this man remembered with tears his fallen comrades. Enlisting in the army in 1939 at the age of 17, he spent the war overseas and came home demobilized in 1946. From his return to Canada, until his death in 1972 he would disappear for months at a time. Retreating into his memories and alcohol he struggled to maintain a "normal life".

The second grave I stop at has a shorter story and a shorter life. This young man died at the age of 22. He was, even at the age of 13, determined to become a member of the military. He reached his goal. This kind, generous, thoughtful, compassionate kid finished high school and joined up in time to be sent to Afghanistan. He and his sergeant were killed in a fire fight outside Kandahar on October 14, 2006.

An Afghanistan Hero

I saw you standing next the wall And can't get you out of my head. One hand in your pocket and one on your dog: I gasped at the life you have led. Your eyes spoke of sadness and fear, Your voice didn't tremble at all ! You guietly spoke of the trauma you've faced As I stood there, truly in awe. Training. Response. Yes, but Courage Before; in the war, but now, too ! To pick up your life and move on day by day You make me feel humble. You do. I know not your name nor your rank. I'll never forget what you shared. "Bravery", you said, " No, a part of my life. We just proved to the world that we cared."
