At our February Meeting – Judith Rygiel

Dr. Judith Rygiel is a maker of cloth, a teacher of weaving and a researcher of hand-woven textiles with a PHD in Canadian History.

Her presentation focused on how two patrons of Acadian weavers in Louisiana promoted homespun textiles to a large public through both public expositions and sales over more than 30 years in the late 1800s. She also brought samples and reproductions of the typical types of cloth woven by these women.

Acadian weavers of that time often used a 2-harness loom, often called a barn loom as it was made by poor farmers using old barn lumber. Their fabrics used plain weaves with the warp threads often commercially made & purchased but with the weft threads usually home spun and dyed to save money. Threads were mostly dyed in blue shades (from Indigo plants) or bleached white – but could also incorporate Louisiana flag colours
