James Powell: The Assassination of D'Arcy McGee

In the wee hours of April 7th 1868, a shot rang out on Sparks Street. Felled while putting his key into the front door of his rooming house, was Thomas D'Arcy McGee, a "Father of Confederation" and close friend of Sir John A. MacDonald. Who did it? Were the Fenians involved? Did Patrick James Whelan, the accused assassin, receive a fair trial?



Come listen to James Powell from the Historical Society of Ottawa speak via Zoom on the life and times of D'Arcy McGee, and on his assassination that shook the new Dominion of Canada.

Born in Bermuda, James is a retired senior officer of the Bank of Canada. He is the author or co-author of three books dealing with some aspect of Canadian economic history: A History of the Canadian Dollar; The Bank of Canada of James Elliott Coyne: Challenges, Confrontation and Change; and (with Jill Moxley), Faking It! A History of Counterfeiting in Canada. He also wrote a History of the G-20 Countries for the Group of Twenty, as well as two corporate books for the Bank of Canada, one focusing on the architecture and art of the Bank of Canada and another on Canada's currency collection. James is a Director of the Historical Society of Ottawa, and is the author of an Ottawa history blog called Today in Ottawa's History.

At our September Meeting



Our speaker in September was Tim Moses speaking on "Preparing for End of Life". This excellent presentation, touched on many topics as outlined in a handout issued with the September 12th Zoom email invitation. Tim's experience in Financial Planning as well as in the funeral business allowed him to pass on insights that may not be readily available from a funeral home agent.

There were 3 main themes: wills, estate organizers and funeral/cemetery arrangements.

Wills: Tim repeatedly emphasized the importance of having a will. Without it, the Auditor General of Ontario will deal with your estate as per provincial legislation.

Estate Organizer: Lists all of one's assets that an executor will need to know about in order to terminate one's financial affairs. These will include online accounts and passwords. Simplify your estate if you can – e.g. getting rid of unnecessary credit cards & bank accounts. Sample organizing templates are freely available, either on the web or from funeral homes, which you can use as is or adapt to meet your needs.

Funeral/Cemetery Arrangements: typical costs were discussed throughout with many options available, Tim's final slide listed local options for cemeteries and funeral homes.

The recording of Tim's presentation (link issued to members in a September 16th email) will no longer be available after Tuesday, October 12.

USING E-TRANSFER



We have set up an account to accept e-Transfers via Auto-deposit so that your transfer will be deposited automatically without the need for a security question and answer. A confirmation email is sent automatically to the sender and an email notice of deposit is also sent to the recipient.

Auto-deposit has the same security features as the regular Interac e-Transfer service, one of the safest digital money transfer services in the world. The money is transferred through established and secure banking procedures that financial institutions have used for years to settle cheques, bank machine deposits and withdrawals.

To use e-transfer, the financial institution the member uses must support interac e-transfer. Please follow the steps below:

- Sign into your online banking (speak to your bank about setting up online capability if required)
- Go to interac e-transfer
- 3. First add the new recipient
- 4. When asked for a recipient name enter *Probus Club of Western Ottawa*.(If you encounter character limitations, try *PROBUS West*)
- 5. For the recipient's email enter *membership@probuswesternottawa.ca*, then *next*.
- 6. If you have more than one account, select the one from which you wish to withdraw funds.
- 7. Enter the amount you are withdrawing then click **send**.
- 8. You should see a notice that the recipient has enabled automatic deposit so that no security question is required.
- 9. In the message box, put the names of all persons for whom you are submitting fees (e.g. John and Jane Doe). Do not use any special characters such as "&".
- 10. Confirm your details and then **send**.
- 11. You will receive a confirmation email with a reference number should follow-up be required.
